

# Survey of Distance Learning in Jewish Education

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# **Executive Summary**

# **Background**

There is a growing interest in the development of distance learning initiatives for Jewish education. There are several pioneering efforts currently underway. Academic institutions, educational organizations, and independent programs are exploring different ways of providing Jewish education to learners that take advantage of new technologies. Several organizations, in particular the Association of Institutions of Higher Learning for Jewish Education (AIHLJE) and the National Board of License (NBL) are particularly interested in how distance learning opportunities can support new professional development for Jewish educators.

JESNA holds a long-standing interest in educational technology. The agency plays a coordinating role among Jewish educational distance learning providers and is developing a clearinghouse of distance learning initiatives for Jewish education. JESNA is also a partner with Jewish Family & Life! and the Nash Family Foundation in the JSkyway project for online professional development.

### Methodology

The study presents different models of distance education, or e-learning, for Jewish education, with an emphasis on programs for the professional development of Jewish educators. It is a work in progress, which will be revised and expanded as other programs are identified and data is refined. Criteria for including programs in this study are:

- a registration process
- interactive courses
- · time bound courses
- · clearly articulated educational goals

An email message announcing the survey was sent to several Jewish education discussion lists, including AIHLJE and Inter-Jed. In addition, surveys were sent directly to known program providers. Follow up calls were made to program directors to fill in missing data. Thirteen of seventeen responses met the criteria for inclusion in this study.

All findings are based on self-reports by representatives of the programs.

### **Out of Scope**

A number of email discussion lists and websites identify themselves as learning courses but do not meet the above criteria. Many of them are based on one-way communications or low interactivity.

Several programs (n = 8) incorporate a combination of delivery methods, (e.g., HUC use conference calls to introduce and conclude courses in addition to e-mail discussions.)

# Field Placements and Residency Requirements for Education Students

Distance learning Master's degree programs that serve as professional development opportunities for Jewish educators include Jewish education and Jewish studies programs. Master's programs in Jewish education require field placements and/or student teaching. As would be expected, MA programs in Jewish studies do not require field placements.

**Chico State University** offers a distance learning program towards a Master's Degree in Jewish Education. The program can be completed entirely online. Field placements are required. Chico State University arranges placements with a team of Jewish studies faculty, education faculty, a local master teacher or staff from the local central agency for Jewish education.

**Gratz College** offers a distance learning program towards a Master's Degree in Jewish Studies. Gratz will offer a Master's Degree in Jewish Studies via videoconferencing with the University of Minnesota in the Fall of 2002. The College plans to offer a Master's Degree in Jewish Studies delivered completely online in the future. There is no residency requirement for the Jewish Studies program.

**Hebrew College** offers distance learning programs toward Master's Degrees in Jewish Education and in Jewish Studies. The Master's Degree in Jewish Education is conducted entirely through videoconferencing. The program is being piloted at a Florida day school. Supervision is provided via videoconferencing in addition to local, face to face interaction with a master teacher. Plans are underway to add online course offerings and expand the program to other small groups of day school teachers. The Jewish Studies program is delivered almost entirely online. The program includes two one-week intensive summer residency components (between the first and second year, and between the second and third year).

Jewish Theological Seminary offers distance learning programs toward Master's Degrees in Jewish Education and in Interdepartmental Studies. Students are required to take five courses in-residence. Most of the students in the Jewish education program already work in Jewish educational settings (day school, afternoon school, or informal), or will be working in the field. Field placements may be arranged in New York, or locally if they are outside of the area. Student teaching placements can also be arranged outside of New York, if necessary. Special arrangements are made for students who are not teachers in day school settings.

**Siegal College of Judaic Studies (formerly Cleveland College of Jewish Studies)** offers distance learning programs towards Master's Degrees in Jewish Education and in Jewish Studies. The Siegal College of Judaic Studies Distance Learning Program is conducted solely through videoconferencing at the remote campuses. There are no field placement or student teaching requirements for the Master's in Jewish Education.

**Spertus Institute of Jewish Studies** offers distance learning programs towards Master's Degrees in Jewish Education and in Jewish Studies. It also offers programs toward a Doctor of Jewish Studies and a Doctor of Science in Jewish Studies. Spertus Institute offers two optional in-residence courses during March and July. Alternatively, students may elect to participate in online courses instead. There are no field placement or student teaching requirements for the Master's program.

# **Degrees Offered**

There is great variation between programs regarding their offerings of degrees and credentials. Six programs offer degree credits toward a BA/BS, MA/MS, DJS/DSJS. One program offers credits toward salary upgrades, and another program is accepted in fulfillment of licensing requirements by the National Board of License. One program offers certification in a specific are of concentration (Jewish Family Education) and three programs offer options to audit.

# **Weekly Time Commitment and Course Duration**

The expected time commitment on the part of the participants vary from one to six hours per week. Many programs are asynchronous and therefore self-paced to some extent. Synchronous components such as videoconferencing and conference calls require students to participate at specific times. In general, courses range from two to sixteen weeks in length. Course durations depend on factors including scheduling during the summer vs the academic year and full vs mini-courses.

## **Formal Requirements**

Of the 13 programs surveyed, ten articulate formal requirements for course credit. All six programs that offer credits toward degrees articulate formal requirements. Of the two remaining programs, one offers credits toward professional upgrade in salary and the other offers accreditation toward licensing by the National Board of License.

### Examples of formal requirements

- written papers
- written exams
- · participation in online discussions
- weekly assignments

Eight of the 13 programs charge tuition per course. These include the six degree programs and the two programs which offer credit toward professional upgrade in salary or National Board of License accreditation. Four of the programs charge additional registration fees which range from \$25 to \$230. Three of the programs charge additional fees for books.

# **Student Population**

### Total Number of Non-Repeated Users

Nine of the thirteen programs surveyed reported statistics on the total number of participants enrolled (non-repeated). These student populations range between 50 and 987 individuals. The majority of respondents did not provide statistics on course completion. The five programs that responded reported completion rates ranging from 40% to 100%.

#### Number of Students Enrolled in Current Term

Eight of the 13 responding programs reported current enrollments ranging from 30 to 543 students at the time of the survey.

# Percent of Students Currently Employed in Jewish Education

The majority of responding programs did not report information about the percent of students currently employed in Jewish education. As expected, JSkyway, an in-service professional development program, reported that 100% of their students are currently employed as Jewish educators.

# Gender, Age, and Religious Stream

Six of the 13 responding programs provided statistics on the demographic characteristics of their students. Among these programs, higher percentages of males (50% - 90%) are enrolled than females (10% - 50%). Students range in age from 17 to 75 years old. Respondents generally did not provide information on students' religious affiliations.

### Conclusion

The use of e-learning as a means for providing sustained Jewish education, especially for educators, is a relatively new phenomenon. For this reason, it is important to document the different models of professional development that take advantage of this burgeoning technology.

There are many noteworthy initiatives for distance learning in Jewish education. This study represents an early snapshot of a very discrete segment of educational offerings that use technology to support professional development for Jewish educators.
