

AJC executive director David A. Harris addressed the consuls general of all twenty-seven European Union member states in New York. He also addressed Berlin's Council on Foreign Relations, among many other groups of leaders across America and around the world.

To strengthen ties to Arab and Muslim nations, AJC leaders traveled to Bahrain, Egypt, Jordan, Morocco, Turkey, and Qatar. They met with top government officials and, in Bahrain, Morocco, and Turkey, with representatives of local Jewish communities.

An array of international guests addressed AJC's 101st Annual Meeting. Among them: the presidents of Colombia and Latvia, the chairman of the World Economic Forum (Davos), Bosnia's foreign minister, India's state secretary, and the head of Morocco's Office of Islamic Affairs.

Getting Heard in a Radically Globalized World

In this globalized, ever-more interconnected world, what sets AJC diplomacy apart? What's the key to our access and impact?

Two factors empower our advocacy on behalf of democratic values, human rights, and Israel's right to stand proudly among the nations: First is the credibility we've earned and the close contacts we've created. Second is our unparalleled presence.

In addition to our headquarters in New York, we maintain full-time offices in the key dip-lomatic hubs of Jerusalem, Geneva, Berlin, and Brussels. We likewise maintain bureaus in Paris, Mumbai, Rome, and Warsaw—each with staff members deeply rooted in the regions they serve. Strengthening our efforts are formal partnerships with twenty-four leading Jewish advocacy groups around the globe.

We've also developed a range of respected AJC international institutes. Each institute focuses intensively on a specific area of policy—human rights, the UN, and interfaith relations—or of regional concern—Africa, Asia, Europe, and Latin America.

Putting these resources to maximum use, we visit more than sixty nations annually. We also meet yearly with the presidents, prime ministers, and foreign ministers of over seventy nations during the UN General Assembly session.

NATO director of policy planning Jaime Shea recently pointed to one of our key goals in the global arena: "AJC's Transatlantic Institute in Brussels stands on the front lines of bringing together political and civic leaders who wish to strengthen the bonds of friendship between Europe and America."

Theology and Terror: Responding to the Iranian Threat

What's at the heart of the Iranian regime? A radical version of Shi'ite theology. It's core conviction? That all Muslims must strive to prompt—even provoke—the arrival of the Mahdi.

When this redeemer arrives, he'll bring every good tiding. Including elimination or conversion of the "kuffar," the infidels. He'll come, however, only after a clash of apocalyptic proportions.

Consider these ideas alongside Iran's unwavering support for international terrorism. Its horrific human rights record. And its call for Israel to be "wiped off the map." Is it any wonder, then, that the possibility of a nuclear Iran strikes fear? What will keep Iran's nuclear ambitions on hold? Only ongoing international pressure.

AJC has made our concern known at every one of hundreds of diplomatic encounters. We've produced a stream of op-eds and radio and newspaper advocacy ads. And we've released six related hard-hitting publications.

AJC president Richard Sideman and AJC executive director David A. Harris urged the UN Security Council to dare not roll the dice on this issue. They implored the Council to vigorously monitor Iranian compliance with international demands.

"This will demonstrate," they declared, "that the international community remains united and firm in its determination that Iran cease any quest for nuclear weapons capability."

Friends Who Speak out in the Face of Fear

Social critics who dare confront extremist movements face enormous challenges. They stand in need of allies. Their safety must be ensured. Their message heard. Their warning heeded.

AJC has presented humanitarian awards—and extended our hand in friendship and in active international solidarity—to Muslim critics of radical Islam.

Among them: Mithal al-Alusi, a member of the Iraqi parliament; Ayaan Hirsi Ali, a Somali-born former member of the Dutch parliament; Magdi Allam, an Egyptian-born Italian journalist; and Salah Choudhury, a Bangladeshi journalist.

Choudhury tirelessly advocates for friendly Muslim-Jewish relations. At AJC headquarters, he declared: "I cannot let my country fall into the grips of the radicals." Human rights lawyer Irwin Cotler, a Canadian parliamentarian and former attorney general, serves as Choudhury's attorney. Cotler's past clients include Nelson Mandela, Jacobo Timerman, and Natan Sharansky.

"Speaking out, speaking up, and taking a strong public stand in defense of heroic prisoners of conscience, such as Mr. Choudhury, is entirely characteristic of the American Jewish Committee," said M.P. Cotler. "AJC is engaged in a sustained international struggle on behalf of the abiding values of our common humanity, chief among them human rights and human dignity."

a different kind of competition

He's a consummate master of competitiveness. The kind of competition he champions, however, sets him apart. Klaus Schwab heads the World Economic Forum (Davos). The organization is known for events that bring together the globe's most influential business, political, and religious leaders. Recently, AJC executive director David A. Harris participated on a Davos plenary panel with former British prime minister Tony Blair.

What's Schwab's driving idea? Innovative entrepreneurship—in private industry and the public realm. In particular, he applauds thoughtful partnerships that pave the way for economic and social progress.

"AJC understands very well how to build effective partnerships. That's one of its great strengths," declared Schwab, addressing our 2007 Annual Meeting. "AJC played such an important role in its first century, and I know that its role as a global nongovernmental organization will only grow in importance in its second century."

Exposing Extremists Seeking Cover While Building Bonds of Mutual Respect

The Muslim Brotherhood—with affiliates throughout the world—says it only wants to put an end to poverty and corruption. Its repackaging efforts seem to be paying off.

Hamas, a Brotherhood branch whose bus bombings maimed and killed hundreds of Israeli civilians, has likewise gained a degree of success in its relentless campaign for legitimacy.

AJC—with our unique Division on Middle East and International Terrorism taking the lead—opposes the international acceptance of these and other extremist groups. And we've voiced our concerns to the White House, State Department, and Congress, to scores of our global diplomatic partners, and at counterterrorism conferences worldwide.

Yes, AJC exposes extremists seeking cover. But we also strive, by many means, to encourage Muslim moderates, and to build bridges between Muslims and Jews.

A newly launched AJC website, for example, www.aslalyahud.org, makes available an extensive collection of material in the Arabic language. All of it from Jewish sources.

The material focuses on Judaism and Jewish cultural involvement in the Arab world. It includes excerpts from scholars like Saadia Gaon and Maimonides and from contemporary Jews writing in Arabic. Also included is a richly detailed timeline of Jewish history.

To help reach out to Arab-speaking web users around the world, the website encourages visitors to respond and present questions.

This pioneering AJC website celebrates—and aims to advance—constructive components and helpful trends in Muslim-Jewish relations.

AJC continues to play a leading role in the ongoing coalitional effort to pass the Workplace Religious Freedom Act. The bill would bolster the rights of workers with religious needs. It would also protect employers from employees who would abuse these rights.

AJC presented our Congressional Leadership Award to Congressman Alcee Hastings (D-FL), Congressman Mark Kirk (R-IL), and Congressman Chris Shays (R-CT). "AJC has made a huge difference, not just for the Jewish people and Israel, but for all humanity," said Congressman Shays.

With the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago, AJC cosponsored a five-day seminar on Catholic-Jewish relations for Latinos and Latinas in the ministry. The twenty-four participants studied with Catholic and Jewish scholars and engaged in dialogue with AJC members.

When AJC Goes to Washington and Washington Goes to AJC

While it's true that AJC's Annual Meeting draws AJC to Washington, it's also true that the gathering draws Washington to AJC. In addition to an array of international speakers, those who addressed the guests at our 101st annual event included fourteen members of the House and eight members of the Senate.

Others from the Washington scene who shared their thoughts included: Zalmay Khalilzad, U.S. ambassador to the UN; R. James Woolsey, former director of the CIA; Ambassador John Danforth, a former U.S. senator; Harris Wofford, a former U.S. senator who helped found the Peace Corps; and Stephen Joel Trachtenberg, president of George Washington University.

Danforth, an ordained Episcopal minister and author of two recent books on the intersection of faith and politics, warned: "The Constitution is not for the purpose of deciding social issues—it's about the structure of government."

Trachtenberg and Wofford discussed their efforts as part of AJC's Task Force on National Service. Trachtenberg served as chair of the thirty-member group. Its goal: to advance the idea that for young Americans, a year of voluntary national service should be the norm, not the exception.

Petrodollars and the Damage Done: Encouraging National Energy Independence

What kind of waste can be great for America? The kind found in second-generation biofuels—such as cellulosic ethanol. These fuels can play a vital role in protecting our natural resources. And winning energy independence.

Indeed, AJC passionately promotes their use and development. But we also work to help cut America's use of petroleum. That's why we strongly advocate laws obliging automakers to boost fuel efficiency. And why we promote the promise of plugin hybrid electric vehicles.

Concern about the environment—and the damage done with American petrodollars—goes back thirty-four years at AJC. What's new is the presence on our staff of full-time energy experts and the rapid intensification of chapter-level advocacy.

In addition, 100 percent of energy used in our U.S. offices is linked to renewable sources. We've also pioneered in offering incentives to AJC employees to purchase a hybrid car. And we're in pursuit of full compliance with Green Building standards.

Are we making our voice heard? "Among the many groups I've worked with, AJC is by far the most proactive and effective on the issue of energy security," declared Dr. Gal Luft, cochair of the Set America Free Coalition, an alliance of groups dedicated to reducing America's dangerous addiction to foreign oil.

Forging Alliances that Advance Cherished Civic Values

On any given day—in houses of worship and conference rooms across America—religious and ethnic leaders are tackling tough intergroup issues. Under AJC auspices, they're building bonds of mutual support. And forging coalitions that aim to advance America's most cherished civic values. The work, to be sure, is an old AJC tradition.

"When few dared speak out, AJC launched a campaign in 1911 in New York State to end discrimination in public accommodations in resorts and amusement parks," declared Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., in 1965. The campaign led to a law that "served as a model for many other states."

Following in this path, a recent three-day meeting in Washington, D.C., co-sponsored by AJC, brought together AJC experts and thirty Mexican American community leaders.

"It was an exceptional opportunity to strengthen the growing ties between the Jewish and the Mexican communities in this country," said Arturo Sarukhán, Mexico's ambassador to the U.S., who addressed the gathering.

AJC maintains relations with more than 200 domestic religious and ethnic organizations. These efforts are mirrored by our extensive intergroup outreach in the world arena.

Erudition, eloquence, passion, and participation. These are his tools. He's honed them to precision. And he employs them time and again—promoting social justice, encouraging intergroup cooperation, making the case for reconciliation.

Father John Pawlikowski is director of Catholic-Jewish Studies at the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago, one of the world's largest schools of theology. He also heads the International Council of Christians and Jews, an umbrella group of thirty-eight Jewish-Christian dialogue organizations worldwide. For more than twenty years, he served on the United States Holocaust Memorial Council.

"I've worked closely with AJC for over forty years," says Father Pawlikowski. "In that time, I've developed a great appreciation for this organization. For its profound commitment to the Jewish people and its equally strong and active support for ethnic and religious solidarity."

"A Proven Track Record" of Advocacy— In the Capital and Across the Country

The U.S. Congress might be the world's most complicated legislative body. Long before a bill becomes a law, a range of committees must consider it. And influencing each committee could call for a separate strategy.

Naturally, then, progress on any piece of legislation takes tireless advocacy. Precisely the kind of advocacy AJC carries out in Washington, D.C., and in state legislatures across America. Has our involvement gained the regard of lawmakers?

"AJC's extremely intelligent voice has won the deepest respect from my colleagues on both sides of the aisle," declared Senator Gordon Smith (R-OR). "In Washington and around the country," said Senator Barbara Mikulski (D-MD), "AJC has built a proven track record on a range of vital issues." Which issues top our domestic agenda?

Energy security—cutting the country's use of oil from unstable, unfriendly, undemocratic governments. Religious liberty—ensuring both that no particular vision of faith be "established"

or "preferred," and that all faiths enjoy the freedom they need to thrive. Immigration reform—urging a plan that combines respect for human dignity with awareness of security concerns.

AJC's extensive work with the Congress is matched by our intensive involvement with the courts. Since our earliest years, we have acted time and again as amicus curiae, "friend of the court"—on behalf of plaintiffs fighting for the values we hold dear.

AJC presented two fully-equipped mobile intensive care units to Israel's Magen David Adom. These gifts, among others, were made possible by AJC's Israel Emergency Fund, which raised more than \$2.4 million during the Second Lebanon War.

AJC celebrated the tenth anniversary of our Russian Jewish Leadership Program. The initiative provides top Russian American Jewish leaders with ten weeks of training by AJC experts in advocacy, media relations, and American Jewish communal affairs.

The Jewish communities of Colombia and Greece each signed agreements linking their communities to AJC. Seeking to foster the fullest possible international cooperation, AJC has established formal partnerships with twenty-four Jewish communities around the world.

Indian Muslim Leaders' Trip to Israel Provokes Protests, Makes History

It was an entirely unprecedented event. An historic and hopeful moment, perhaps some kind of turning point. No doubt, however, it had its vociferous detractors.

The AJC-sponsored visit to Israel by Indian Muslim leaders was met in India with threats of boycotts and scattered protests. In no way, however, did opposition dampen the enthusiasm of delegation leader Maulana Jamil Ilyasi, president of the All India Organization of Imams and Mosques.

Declared Ilyasi, who leads some 500,000 imams serving an estimated 174 million Indian Muslims: "The time for violence has come to an end, and the era of peace and dialogue between Muslims and Jews has begun."

The extensive influence in India of this delegation will "encourage the moderates," explained Rabbi David Rosen, AJC international director of Interreligious Affairs, as quoted in the *Jerusalem Post*.

The delegation met with, among others, Israeli president Shimon Peres, Israeli foreign minister Tzipi Livni, Israel's chief rabbis, and the heads of its Muslim Sharia courts. Said Peres: "These meetings were of the utmost importance to Israel and the Jewish people."

Another groundbreaking AJC trip brought to Israel a delegation of top journalists from Indonesia, the world's most populous Muslim nation.

"There's new thinking in Indonesia, including in the government, about upgrading our relations with Israel," said participant Endy Bayuni, editor-in-chief of the English-language *Jakarta Post*. Bayuni spoke of the regular column in his paper by a former Israeli diplomat to southeast Asia.

AJC's Project Interchange, which conducted these trips, has so far brought to Israel more than 4,000 influential political, civic, and religious leaders from around the world.

"BDS": Countering Israel's Opponents in the West

Have you heard of BDS? The acronym stands for boycotts, divestment, and sanctions. With these, anti-Israel elements in the West hope to bludgeon Israel into international isolation.

Britain's largest academic union, for instance, recently dropped a proposed academic boycott of Israel. AJC played a key administrative role in gathering a list of 446 American university presidents who condemned the proposal.

In a *New York Times* ad, published by AJC, an initial group of 286 presidents signed onto a simple request by Columbia University president Lee Bollinger. They asked that their universities be boycotted too if Israel's universities were targeted.

"It takes nothing less than an astute and truly strategic effort to successfully counter left-wing elements in the West who seek to demoralize Jewish communities and defame Israel," declared Anthony Julius, a prominent British lawyer and academic.

"AJC stands out," he continued, "for its ability to take on the task in a way that will not backfire, but rather bring on board those who need most critically to be reached." In a 2000 British courtroom battle, with our steady behind-the-scenes support, Julius defeated Holocaust-denier David Irving.

An innovative new AJC website, Z-Word.com, gives insight about the Mideast and Zionism to Israel activists everywhere. The website explores a range of moral, political, and historical issues.

How a Unique Jewish Leadership Conference Brings Together World's "Best and Brightest"

Maxim Behar is CEO of Bulgaria's top public relations firm. He's also a tireless champion of Bulgaria's Jewish community and a board member of Bulgaria's Supreme Jewish Council.

He was one of 150 Jewish leaders from fifty-one countries who joined together in Washington, D.C., for AJC's 14th International Leadership Conference. "I came back to Bulgaria full of ideas," he said. "AJC attracts people who care deeply about the Jewish world, but also like to think in ways that are pragmatic and strategic."

"At a time when Jews around the world are facing great dangers, as well as experiencing important triumphs, and when Jewish kinship bonds are under pressure, AJC connects Jewish leaders," said Shain.

"The conference is an essential forum. The best and brightest gather to consider communal challenges, build professional ties, and strengthen their shared affinity with the State of Israel. Without a doubt, it is one of the most impressive efforts I have seen."

The Improvisational Spirit of Jazz: Engaging Jewish Youth Today

Xavier University's jazz band belts out the music on the CD *New Orleans Crescendo*. Like all good jazz, the sound blends disciplined technique with free-flowing experimentalism and exhilarating improvisation.

These same alluring qualities infuse the outlook and activities of ACCESS: AJC's New Generation Project—which created the CD together with the Office of Black Ministry of the Archdiocese of New York.

An ACCESS delegation recently visited New Orleans to deliver a \$15,000 check—from the CD's proceeds—to Xavier, an historically Black institution that was hit hard by Hurricane Katrina.

The funds will strengthen the university's educational summer programs for local high school students. "Not only are we the beneficiaries of your ecumenically-minded members," said Xavier president Norman C. Francis, "but we are also participants in a growing relationship."

In response to Katrina, AJC ACCESS members in their twenties and thirties have so far made

four trips to New Orleans. They've gutted homes, gotten to know local college students, and met with religious and ethnic groups.

Other recent AJC ACCESS events: a wide range of lectures, workshops, and roundtables around the country; participation in fundraisers for Darfur and rallies for Israel; and diplomatic missions to Poland, Germany, Argentina, and Ethiopia.

Under the ACCESS umbrella, AJC also sponsors active university societies at Colgate, Cornell, Harvard, New York University, and Princeton.

The new media tools are many: Among them blogs, podcasts, RSS feeds, and social networks. Our primary website, www.ajc.org, shows web users how they can link into AJC applications of each and every one of these powerful communications tools.

Meanwhile, our presence in traditional media outlets continues to grow. AJC executive director David A. Harris's regular radio commentaries—on the issues most vital to us—now reach more than 35 million listeners on the CBS radio network.

We are also quoted in highly influential publications, such as the *Economist*, the *International Herald Tribune*, the *Wall Street Journal*, and the *New York Times*, among many others. In addition, articles and op-eds by AJC leaders regularly appear in newspapers across the country and around the world.

activism in "every corner of the world"

In the 1990s, AJC emerged as a "global nongovernmental organization, with offices and alliances and formal partnerships in every corner of the world," writes historian Marianne Sanua in Let Us Prove Strong, the American Jewish Committee, 1945-2006.

The book was one of two finalists in the American Jewish Studies category of the 2007 National Jewish Book Awards. It's an illuminating, independent account of AJC activism in America and around the world.

Part of that activism involves authoritative research. One example: *The War Curriculum in Iranian Schoolbooks*, published by AJC and the Center for Monitoring the Impact of Peace. Among its findings, the book reports how third-grade children are assured that "... the day will come when all Muslims will be united, liberate Palestine, and save Jerusalem from the hands of the enemies of Islam."







The American Jewish Committee is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, tax ID #EIN 13-5563393. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007, 8.8% of total income was applied to fundraising expenses. 80.3% of total expenses was applied directly to program services.

Based on the percentage of our income used for fundraising versus programming, we are listed among the *Chronicle of Philanthropy's* "Philanthropy 400." This is an impressive distinction when you consider that there are over 800,000 publicly supported nonprofits in America.

In addition, three other independent charity watchdog organizations—the American Institute of Philanthropy, *Forbes* Annual Survey, and Charity Navigator—awarded AJC their highest marks. In fact, Charity Navigator has recognized AJC with its highest four-star rating for the third consecutive year, declaring that AJC "outperforms most charities in America in its efforts to operate in the most fiscally responsible way possible. This exceptional designation … differentiates AJC from its peers and demonstrates to the public it is worthy of their trust."

WOMEN'S CAMPAIGN BOARD

Our Women's Campaign Board plays a vital role in supporting the work of the American Jewish Committee. The board has long attracted community-minded philanthropic leaders from throughout the New York metropolitan region.

The Women's Campaign Board holds a variety of events, social and educational in nature, that raise around \$1 million a year for AJC projects.

DEVELOPING LEADERSHIP EXPERTISE

The Hilda Katz Blaustein Institute provides training in leadership skills for select groups of current and prospective AJC leaders. The training is designed to enhance knowledge of AJC's philosophical and organizational principles; to deepen understanding of Jewish identity and American Jewish life; to strengthen connection to the national organization; and to build bonds between lay and staff leaders.

The Sholom D. Comay Leadership for the Future Fellowship, named in honor of our late beloved president, works to cultivate the national leadership potential of outstanding young leaders. Through participation in the Board of Governors, AJC's primary decision-making body, the program brings a select group into the center of major AJC initiatives.

Shulamith Bahat, AJC associate executive director and director of Leadership and Board Services, manages the activities of the Hilda Katz Blaustein Leadership Development Program and the Sholom D. Comay Fellowship Program.

The Emerging Leadership Council is a unique forum for alumni of the Sholom D. Comay Fellowship, designed to facilitate the continued involvement of its graduates at the national level.

The Rosenthal Fellowship awards graduate school students scholarships for summer positions at the State Department, Department of Defense, and on Capitol Hill. The Fellowship was established in memory of Harold Rosenthal, killed in 1976, at age twenty-nine, during a terrorist attack in Istanbul, while traveling as an aide to Senator Jacob Javits (R-NY).

The American Jewish Committee Fellows Program, funded by the Goldman Family Foundation, is a highly competitive program open to undergraduate students in their junior or senior years. The program seeks to develop future leaders in the fields of politics, management, public relations, business, and diplomacy.


Remembering

OUR LEADERS AND FRIENDS

Norman Agin, a devoted leader and dear friend, served as a member of AJC's Board of Governors and, earlier, in various leadership posts at our Central New Jersey Chapter, including as president, treasurer, and campaign chair. In 2006, on the occasion of AJC's 100th anniversary, he received the chapter's Centennial Leadership Award.

Morris Fine, deeply connected to AJC for seven decades, joined the staff in 1937.

As head of our Jewish Research and Information Service, he led AJC efforts to combat Nazi propaganda in the U.S. In 1946, he was appointed editor of the *American Jewish Year Book*, a position he continued to hold over the years while also assuming other leadership roles. In 1974, he was appointed Director of Foreign Affairs. With his sharp intellect, quiet demeanor, and unbounded passion for Jewish well-being and security, he made invaluable contributions to AJC, the Jewish people, and the civic good.

At Revson, over a twenty-five year career, she played an extraordinary role, inspiring and dynamically championing innovative initiatives, in Israel and America, that advanced democratic values, Jewish life, and Jewish culture. We were privileged to work together with her in pursuit of her passion for building a new generation of Jewish leadership.

Harriet Heilbrunn, beloved friend and generous benefactor, lived a remarkable life of meaning and valor. Along with her cherished late husband, Robert, she determined to help build a better world. Throughout her nearly seven decades with Bob, and later on her own, she remained devoted to a host of philanthropic causes. Both Bob and Harriet were members of AJC's Board of Governors and National Leadership Council. In 1997, they established AJC's Harriet and Robert Heilbrunn Institute for International Interreligious Understanding, greatly expanding AJC's interreligious work. In 1998, they endowed AJC's Robert and Harriet Heilbrunn Humanitarian Relief Fund, allowing AJC to respond quickly and effectively to crises at home and around the world.
