Matching requirement	There does not appear to be a matching requirement for the state and local demonstration projects. However, there is a 1:1 non-federal contribution match required for the media block grants.	Grantees participating in full service and multi-state projects are required to match 20% of project costs.
Priority grants	HHS will give priority to eligible states that have demonstrated progress in achieving a purpose or need to reduce out-of-wedlock births or absent fathers.	HHS may give preference to projects serving mostly low-income fathers.

Participants	Grantees must target low-income participants. Family violence	Grantees must consult with domestic violence experts or coalitions in developing activities. The grant application must describe how the activities "will address, as appropriate, issues of domestic violence." The grant application must describe how the entity "will assess for the presence of, and intervene to resolve domestic violence and child abuse and neglect."
Voluntary participation	The grant application must describe what the grantee will do, "to the extent relevant," to ensure that participation is voluntary, and to inform participants.	Not addressed.
