Analysis of Contributions on Yes and No Sides on Ballot Measure 30

There are 13 political action committees advocating for Ballot Measure 30 and seven urging a "no" vote. Voting on Measure 30 is underway and will end on February 3rd. If passed, the measure will overturn the revenue bill that drew bipartisan support and ended the 2003 legislative session.

The "yes" and "no" players and their total contributions are summarized below in Chart 1. The "yes" side has raised \$925,078 while Measure 30 opponents have raised \$871,041.

As of 2/29/04, Nurses United PAC failed to file a 2nd pre-election report as required by election law.

Public employee unions dominate the "yes" side, but there is also support from the PAC of the Oregon Business Association. Small regional "yes" on 30 groups are also active, and there is support from a small PAC representing Oregonians with disabilities.

Conservative anti-tax groups dominate the "no" side. As noted in Chart 3 several businesses made major contributions, representing 77 percent of fundraising to Oregon Citizens for a Sound Economy. Other business groups such as Associated Oregon Industries are remaining neutral on Ballot Measure 30.

It should be noted that the primary expenditures by three "yes" PACs are contributions to the Yes on 30-Our Oregon committee. These ally PACs are Nurses United, the PAC affiliated with the Oregon Business Association, and the ballot measure PAC of OPEU (Oregon Public Employees Union). Including the contributions from these ally groups represents some double counting with contributions to the Yes on 30-Our Oregon PAC.

Similar double counting occurs in regard to contributions to the Taxpayer Defense Fund that received 47 percent of its money from two ally PACs, Oregon Citizens for a Sound Economy and Taxpayer Association of Oregon Ballot Measure PAC.

Itemized summaries of top donors to each of the "yes" and "no" PACs are provided below in Charts 2 and 3.

Over half (55 percent or \$391,001) of the contributions to the major proponent PAC, Yes on 30-Our Oregon, came from the three major public employees unions: Service Employees International Union (SEIU) Local 503, Oregon School Employees Association (OSEA), and the Oregon Education Association (OEA.) These labor unions represent approximately 106,000 members who provide services to Oregonians and are directly affected by changes in state budgets. Union members have decided to dedicate a portion of their dues to issue funds. (Fair share members - those whose union dues cover only collective-bargaining expenses - are exempted from these assessments.) Decisions about allocation of these issue funds are made by boards composed of and elected by union members.

On the "no" side, the major three ongoing ally PACs are also member based. Oregon Citizens for a Sound Economy has 12,000 statewide members. The Oregon Family Council reports that 1,700 churches and 13,000 individuals in the state distribute its Voters' Guide. The Taxpayer Association of Oregon lists as a goal to recruit "6,000 taxpayers to help inspire "citizen-based" lobbying in Oregon.
