### CONFERENCE OF JEWISH COMMUNAL SERVICE 88th ANNUAL MEETING

May 27, 1986

Stouffer's Inn on the Square, Cleveland Ferne Katleman, President, formally opened the 88th Annual Meeting Business Session.

### THE FEDERAL BUDGET AND SOCIAL SERVICES

Mark Talisman, Executive Director of the Washington Action Office of the Council of Jewish Federations, offered an analysis of the serious harm which could be inflicted on the delivery of social services if significant reductions are made in the Federal Budget.

Although the problem is one which would effect all Americans, Mr. Talisman noted, "Many Jews and Jewish agencies will likewise suffer."

He urged increased efforts to maintain an adequate level of governmental spending for social services and a renewed effort to increase the commitment of the Jewish community to the plight of the economically and socially disadvantaged.

### RESOLUTIONS

Dr. Lawrence Rubin, Chair of the CJCS Public Issues Committee, presented the report of that committee. The resolutions, as presented, were approved by the membership present, and dealt with: Federal Responsibility in Providing Human Services; Communal Responsibility for Meeting Human Needs; Israel; Soviet Jewry; and International Terrorism.
